



#### **Reconstructing the Ottoman Music Corpus: Interpretational Issues of Hampartsum Sources**

Ottoman music sources written in Hampartsum notation during the nineteenth century feature different scribal usages of the notation system, which sometimes causes interpretational problems for an accurate critical edition of these sources. While the late nineteenth century sources represent a clearer usage of pitch signs and duration markers, the descriptive function of the notation in the early sources is restricted to a minimal usage of duration signs, various intonational distinctions of the pitch signs depending on the makâm, and divisional distribution of usûl patterns. While particular applications of the notation system reflect individual scribal characteristics, intertextual connections between these sources can also reveal particular lineages of textual transmission within the music tradition. This panel organized by the CMO project, in collaboration with the Orient-Institut Istanbul and Istanbul Technical University, mainly focuses on the Hampartsum manuscript no. 1537 located in the Istanbul Archeological Museums Library (TR-Iam 1537). Research Assistant Duygu Taşdelen (Anadolu University State Conservatory, Musicology Department) will be presenting her extensive study on TR-Iam 1537. CMO music editors will also speak about their own experiences concerning the technical interpretation of Hampartsum sources from collections held at Istanbul University. The online panel will be followed by a discussion led by discussants Prof. Dr. Nilgün Doğrusöz-Dişiaçık and Prof. Dr. Ralf Martin Jäger.

Corpus Musicae Ottomanicae (CMO) is a long-term project for the critical edition of Near Eastern music manuscripts, including a parallel edition of song texts, and an online catalogue of Ottoman music sources. The project focusing on manuscripts of Ottoman music written in Hampartsum and Western staff notations during the 19th century is funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG).
