Academic Calendar

Academic Year Structure

For instructional purposes, one academic year is divided into two semesters: **autumn and spring**.

Each semester encompasses a minimum of 14 weeks (70 days) of instruction, exclusive of registration and final examination weeks.

The University Senate establishes the precise Academic Calendar for each year, which is made accessible on the website. These dates may not be identical from year to year but are generally similar.

Semester Schedules

Autumn Semester:

Commences from mid-September and concludes at the end of January.

Spring Semester:

Commences from mid-February and concludes at the end of June.

The specific Academic Calendar customised for exchange students for a particular academic year is shared with the applicants upon acceptance.

National holidays

- ♣ April 23rd: National Sovereignty and Children's Day (Commemorating the establishment of the Turkish Grand National Assembly in 1920)
- ♣ May 19th: Atatürk Commemoration and Youth & Sports Day (Marking Atatürk's arrival in Samsun in 1919 to initiate the War of Independence)
- ♣ July 15th: Democracy and National Unity Day
- ♣ August 30th: Victory Day (celebrating the victory over invading forces in 1922)
- ♣ October 29th: Republic Day (Commemorating the declaration of the Turkish Republic in 1923)

Religious holidays

- ♣ Ramazan Bayramı (Eid Ramadan): A three-day festival celebrating the end of Ramadan fasting.

Dates of these religious festivals change each year as they follow the Islamic calendar, occurring approximately 10-11 days earlier annually.

System of Study

Study Programmes

The undergraduate programmes at MSKU are structured within various departments under faculties and schools. Upon successful completion of eight semesters of study, students are awarded a **Bachelor's Degree** (B.S. or B.A.), corresponding to the “first cycle”. Meanwhile, vocational schools offer programmes lasting for four semesters and lead to an Associate's Degree, which is a “short cycle” qualification.

For those seeking advanced education, the graduate schools or institutes at MSKU provide postgraduate courses and programmes that culminate in a **Master's Degree** (M.S. or M.A), classified as the "second cycle," or a **Doctorate Degree** (Ph.D.), categorized as the "third cycle."

The fundamental component of any study program is the [course](#), which typically comprises a series of lectures and assignments when required. Total class hours for a course, either compulsory or elective, may encompass practical training in addition to theoretical teaching, resulting in a comprehensive educational experience.

Credit System

MSKU has completely adopted the **ECTS credit system**.

The credit value of a course is calculated by the principles determined by the Senate, taking into account the credit range determined according to the higher education qualifications framework set by the Higher Education Council for a specific diploma level and field, as well as the learning outcomes that express the contribution of that course to the knowledge, skills, and competencies that the student will acquire, clearly specified theoretical or practical course hours, and the necessary study hours for other activities envisaged for students.

The estimated workload for a full-time student in one academic year is 60 ECTS credits, meaning **30 ECTS per semester**.

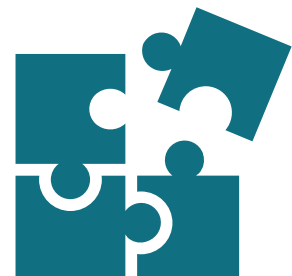

Grading System

Assessment Method

In each course, the instructor assesses the grade on a scale of 0 to 100, considering factors such as midterm and final exam results, in-semester assignments, and attendance. The conversion of these 0 to 100 grades into a letter grade can be done using either the absolute assessment method, which evaluates individual performance independently, or the relative assessment method, which compares a student's performance to their peers within the same class. To calculate the semester GPA, each course's credit is multiplied by the associated grade coefficient. The total achievement score is then divided by the total credit hours for the semester.

Language Requirements

Language of Instruction

Generally, the language of instruction at MSKU is **Turkish**. However, certain degree programmes are **either entirely or partially** conducted in a foreign language, primarily **English**. Furthermore, certain departments actively engaged in Erasmus mobility activities provide courses or **course packages** in English, along with customized study materials and examinations in English to support incoming exchange students.

To attend any course conducted in **Turkish**, it is strongly recommended that students have a minimum language proficiency level of B2.

Turkish Language Course

Incoming students are provided with the opportunity to enrol in a "Turkish Language Course" at the beginner's level, which consists of three hours of instruction per week. This course is offered every semester and spans a minimum of 30 hours of lecture time. Importantly, both the course and study materials are provided free of charge. Typically, incoming students incorporate this course into their weekly schedules and include it in their Learning Agreement to earn credit points. The level of achievement is assessed through examinations, and the results are recorded on the final transcript as a grade. It is **strongly recommended** that exchange students who have no prior knowledge of Turkish consider including this course in their study programme and learning agreement.

General Information on Courses

Course Types and Availability

Courses labelled as "**Compulsory**" are an essential part of the curriculum and are consistently offered. In contrast, courses marked as "**Elective**" are chosen by students based on personal interest or alignment with academic goals, but they are not obligatory. The availability of elective courses may vary depending on changing circumstances. Incoming students' selection of elective courses may be subject to adjustment after their arrival, especially when the precise semester schedule is announced. It is important to note that timetable clashes can also occur when selecting courses from different years within a specific programme or from separate programmes. In these situations, it may be necessary to make adjustments.

Course Load

MSKU requires that incoming students should take minimum of 15 ECTS credits per semester, with a maximum limit of **30 ECTS** credits. Nonetheless, flexibility is available for negotiation if the sending institution has specific course requirements or credit expectations for their outgoing students.

Course Participation and Schedule

The type of participation depends on the course's nature. If a selected course is already a fixed component of a standard curriculum, incoming students follow the same schedule as local students. However, if a course is exclusively available to incoming students, they attend it individually according to arranged schedules.

Course Selection

It is strongly recommended that most of the courses to be completed at MSKU align with student's specialization at home institution. It is possible that the most suitable courses may be offered by different departments and faculties, and this is acceptable. In addition, students are free to select one or two courses from different study programmes to create a study plan that aligns with their interests. Nevertheless, course units directly related to the student's field of study under which the application is submitted should account for at least half of the total ECTS workload outlined in the proposed learning agreement.

Definite course registration for incoming students is completed on the **Student Registration and Information System (SURIS)** after their arrival, subsequent to meeting with the academic coordinator and agreeing on the final selections.

Changes to the initially proposed study plan can be implemented by completing the "During Mobility" section of the "Learning Agreement for Studies" within the first 30 days of the semester start.

Basis and Eligibility

Nominations are accepted based on and in accordance with the valid **inter-institutional agreement (IIA)** signed between the sending and receiving institutions. However, there is room for flexibility, which can be negotiated, regarding the number of incoming students per semester or the field of study for nominated students if it does not align with the conditions outlined in the agreement.

Method

After receiving the eligible nomination, students are contacted directly and provided with comprehensive information and all necessary documents related to the application procedure. Application documents are expected to be submitted via-email to intoffice@mu.edu.tr before the specific deadlines.

Students must complete the interactive form on a computer, sign it, have it confirmed by the sending institution, and then scan it to create a PDF in good condition.

Learning Agreement for Study Mobility

Online Learning Agreement (OLA) Platform is available at <https://learning-agreement.eu/> for completing and signing the learning agreements digitally. Students will receive assistance and advance information to ensure accurate data entry. Alternatively, students can use the traditional paper version sent to them, fill it out on a computer, sign it, have it confirmed by the sending institution, and then scan it to create a PDF in good condition.

Transcript of Records

Official Transcript of Records displaying the student's previous and current studies should be issued by the sending university, either signed by the relevant authority or be electronically verifiable.

Copy of Passport or National ID Document

National ID document should be used as an alternative only when the passport is not available at the time of application.

Photo

The electronic version of a passport-sized face photograph in JPG format should be in acceptable clarity and resolution. This photograph will be uploaded on SURIS and appear on student ID cards.



Admission & Registration

Admission (Acceptance)

Once the application documents are received, they are processed and students are notified in case of any missing documents or any need for modification. The decision of admission is made within 4 weeks after the application deadline and the admission package including the official **Acceptance Letter**, approved **Learning Agreement**, precise **Academic Calendar** and **Student Information Guide** is sent directly to the student via-e-mail.

Formal Registration

Upon arrival, each incoming student is assigned a unique **Student ID number** and registered in the SURIS system using this ID. This official registration includes their initial personal and educational information, followed by course registration. After the activation process, students receive a “**MSKU Student Email Address**” which also serves as their username for most official procedures and for accessing the university's online platforms and systems.

Student ID Card

Each incoming student is issued an “**MSKU Student ID Card**” upon arrival. This card grants access to various campus facilities, including the library, computer labs, health centre, dining services, and sports facilities, with the same rights and responsibilities as domestic students. Additionally, the Student ID Card provides access to various discounts, such as for travel, cinema tickets, and museum passes.



Support & Certification

Orientation and Mentoring

All accepted students receive comprehensive support throughout their mobility experience - **before, during, and after** their stay. This assistance is available both collectively and on an individual basis, utilizing various communication channels, including immediate support through WhatsApp groups.

Following the welcome and registration process, orientation meetings are organized to provide students with essential information about upcoming procedures. During these meetings, students complete initial paperwork, receive a campus tour, and get help with obtaining Turkish mobile phone package, city travel card etc. Additionally, they are offered technical assistance regarding dormitory procedures, insurance matters, residence permit, and hospital visits.

Each student also meets with the relevant department or faculty coordinator to finalize their course selections based on personal needs and course availability. If any changes to the learning agreement are necessary, these are addressed at this time. Departmental coordinators continue to provide academic support until the end of the mobility period, while administrative and practical matters are managed by the responsible International Relations Office (IRO) staff and assigned buddy students.

Certification

Certificate of Attendance

At the end of the mobility period, each incoming student receives a “**Certificate of Attendance**” to verify their participation and confirm the actual mobility period. A standard MSKU form is utilized for this certificate; however, pre-printed documents required by the sending university are also accepted for approval.

Transcript of Records

A “**Transcript of Records After Mobility**” is issued for each incoming student within four weeks after the completion of their studies, including the final examination period. This document is officially approved with a wet signature and stamp. It contains the student’s personal information, details about the sending and receiving institutions, and academic outcomes for each course taken as outlined in the learning agreement. Specifically, it includes the course code, title, credit value, local and ECTS grades, along with comprehensive information on evaluation, credit, and grading systems.



Accommodation

Accommodation Options

MSKU provides incoming Erasmus students with the option to stay in the private student dormitory called Residorm situated within the main campus. The International Relations Office has a special arrangement with Residorm management to reserve a limited number of beds for incoming students upon request. Under this agreement, Residorm can host incoming students for short-term stays of one or two semesters.

While students are free to choose alternative accommodation, such as rented private apartments, there are potential risks and challenges to be considered associated with this choice.

Finding suitable private apartments for short-term stays can be difficult, as most landlords prefer year-long contracts. Additionally, rents in Mugla can be quite expensive compared to many other cities, which may add financial strain. If incoming students opt for a private rental, they should be prepared to face various issues, including utility set-up such as heating, electricity, water subscriptions, and internet connections, maintenance costs and additional expenses related to furnishing the apartment. More importantly, when applying for a residence permit, it is crucial to provide specific documents to verify the accommodation address and obtaining these documents from the landlords of private apartments can be challenging and time-consuming.

Choosing the dormitory would offer a more secure and hassle-free living arrangement, allowing incoming students focus on the studies and enjoy their mobility experience.

Residorm Student Dormitory

Residorm is a modern, comfortable, secure and self-sufficient dormitory for university students offering such facilities as being right on campus, well designed rooms with inside bathrooms and showers, 24-hour security, finger print controlled entry/exit, reception, kitchen and catering facilities, Wi-Fi, weekly housekeeping, study rooms, resting and TV rooms, elevators, no extra bills for electricity, water, heating and internet, disabled accessible rooms, infirmary, laundry room, social areas, canteen, shopping area, and yearlong events and activities.

Incoming students who wish to be accommodated in Residorm Student Dormitory on campus should make their request on the application form. Information about the details regarding reservation, prices, deposit payment, payment methods, procedures, etc. are communicated to the students after acceptance.

Visa & Residence Permit & Insurance

Visa

Visa requirements for Türkiye vary depending on the nationality of the student. Some citizens must obtain a visa from Turkish embassies or consulates in their home country, while others may enter Türkiye without a visa for up to 90 days or can obtain a visa upon arrival at the border. It is advisable for students to apply for the **Erasmus student visa** in their home country before departing, as this can provide additional benefits. Even if a student enters Türkiye using their visa exemption, they will still be eligible to apply for a residence permit once in the country. For specific visa requirements, students should consult the nearest Turkish Embassy or Consulate. Residence Permit

Foreign incoming students planning to study in Türkiye for more than 90 days must apply for a **student residence permit** within a specified timeframe upon their arrival, regardless of their visa's validity. Appointments for the application is made through an online system, and students must submit a complete application file containing the required documents to the local **Migration Office** on the appointed day to initiate the process. The International Relations Office provides assistance to all incoming Erasmus students in making online appointments, preparing the necessary documents, and submitting the application file. Once the procedures are completed and the application is approved, incoming foreign students will receive a **residence permit card** and a **foreign ID number**, which legalizes their stay in Türkiye.

Insurance

All incoming students are required to have **valid health insurance** that meets the minimum policy content requirements in order to apply for a student residence permit. However, health insurance purchased in the student's home country will not meet these requirements and will not be accepted by the officials at the Migration Office. Additionally, such policies would need to be translated into Turkish, incurring extra costs. Furthermore, if students have any health issues, their foreign insurance company may not have agreements with local hospitals in Türkiye. This could result in out-of-pocket expenses for treatment and difficulty in securing reimbursement later.

It is highly recommended that students purchase private health insurance upon arrival in Türkiye, prior to applying for the residence permit. Local insurance companies provide policies for foreigners in both Turkish and English, ensuring they cover the minimum required conditions accepted by the Migration Office.

Private health insurance is not necessary for those eligible for healthcare services in Türkiye under bilateral social security agreements, provided they document their eligibility. Students should visit the social security office in their home country before arriving in Türkiye to obtain a document known as "formular." Upon arrival, they can get local Social Security Office approval for this document to use it as insurance in their residence permit application.

Travel & Campus & Living Expenses

Travel to Mugla

Mugla Province has two international airports:

Turkish Airlines and many international carriers offer direct flights to Dalaman and Bodrum from major European capitals, though flights via Istanbul are more frequent. For those traveling by road from Istanbul, several coach companies run daily services to Mugla city center, though the journey takes nearly 10 hours. The closest major cities to Mugla are **Izmir** and **Antalya**, to where direct flights from most capitals and major cities of Europe are also available.

If arriving at Bodrum Airport, students can use the airport shuttle service provided by Mugla Municipality to reach the coach station in Mugla city center. For those arriving at Dalaman Airport, a private pickup service at a set price can be arranged.

Main Campus

The main campus of MSKU is located in the Kötekli area, approximately a 10-minute drive from the city centre. A detailed **campus map**, provided by MSKU Location Services, can be found at <https://harita.mu.edu.tr/>

Living Expenses

Estimated living expenses for students in Türkiye can vary based on lifestyle, spending habits, and location. International students can generally expect to live on a budget of **400-650 EUR** per month. Living costs in larger cities like Istanbul, Ankara, and Izmir, as well as popular tourist destinations, tend to be higher than in smaller towns. However, outside of these expensive areas and main tourist resorts, the cost of living is quite affordable.

For students from Europe, the exchange rate of the Turkish Lira is advantageous, making basic necessities reasonably priced. Seasonal fruits and vegetables are as well as dining out is generally affordable. Public transportation is convenient and relatively inexpensive in all cities. Intercity travel options are also affordable and comfortable, allowing international students to explore the country during term breaks or official holidays.

Some items that may be more expensive in Türkiye compared to many European countries include meat, fast food, high-quality coffee, cosmetics, technological devices, internet service, and petrol. In contrast, water, fruits, vegetables, haircuts, textiles, local transportation, and medical care are generally cheaper in Türkiye than in most European countries.
