*** PROCEDURAL/REGULATORY QUESTIONS

Q. To the best of your knowledge, do the following direct democracy mechanisms exist in [COUNTRY] today at the national level? (yes/no)






A2: Survey results for each stage of the referendum cycle






05 Media coverage








