Lectures and Seminars

From 1969/ to 2008, I have been teaching regularly. Since Habilitation in 1975, this always included a lecture (sometimes two), two or three seminars and a research colloquium. During my years at the Pädagogische Hochschule, my teaching focused mostly on German politics, local government, educational policies, but also included seminars on Israeli-Arab relations, Turkey, and migration. Since 1980, my focus is on comparative politics. Regularly I gave a basic lecture on comparative politics, with special emphasis on institutions, parties, elections, and civil society. Other regular lecture themes include comparative migration, and German post-war history. In have also given lectures on Turkey, the Kurdish problem, the Israeli-Arab conflict, and – during my year in Tokyo – on European modern history (1870-1945), European political culture, and European integration.

Seminars included regular the political systems of Italy and Turkey, the consociational democracies Switzerland, Austria and the Netherlands, institutions like Second Chambers and the federal president. I also offered a series of seminars about the European party families, the Christian Democrats, Social Democrats, and Liberals, about European party systems, and German policy issues like the reform of social welfare. About a third of my seminars were directly related to migration issues, my main research interest in the last years.
