Die Dissertation muss eine Zusammenfassung beinhalten (§9 (5) Nr. 1 Satz 1). Hierfür gibt es keine formalen Vorgaben/Layout-Vorgaben. Üblich ist es, die Zusammenfassung in der Sprache der Dissertation zu erstellen.

Info für die Darstellung der eingegangenen Vorveröffentlichungen:

The current doctoral regulations of the Faculty of Mathematics and Computer Science allow a doctoral thesis to be either in the form of a cumulative dissertation (in the strict sense of §8 (7) of the doctoral regulations) or in the form of a monograph.

If your doctoral thesis is in the form of a monograph you have to describe at the beginning of your dissertation which preprints or papers by you (or by you and co-authors) were used (in total or partially) in what way to form which chapter(s)/section(s)/part(s) of your doctoral thesis (cf. §8 (6)).

(Read: It is allowed to use preprints/papers (or parts thereof) of your results as part of your monograph as long as you make it transparent. Thus the term “monograph” is not used in a strict etymological sense by our doctoral regulations.)

There is no formal layout to adhere to for the necessary description at the beginning of a monograph. Just make the description (which preprints/papers by you (and co-authors) were used for parts of the thesis and in what way) as transparent as possible and give bibliographic details for these preprints/papers as usual, i.e. in a way that makes them uniquely and preferably persistently identifiable.

If these preprints/papers are with co-authors: At the time you hand in your dissertation an adequate description of your own contribution to these multi-authored preprints/papers is necessary. This can either be done within the dissertation at the beginning or with separate co-authorship statement(s) handed in to the Prüfungsamt. In the latter case, please indicate at the beginning of your dissertation, that you handed in separate co-authorship statement(s).

Concrete fictional example: Let's say your name is Noether. You have one preprint on arXiv without any co-authors and one published paper together with Einstein. Both were part of your doctoral project and contents from both form major parts of your dissertation.

Example of a description at the beginning of your doctoral thesis might be:

- Chapter 2 of this thesis is a verbatim reprint of the multi-authored paper “New results by Einstein and me” [EN23].
- The material presented in Chapter 3 of this thesis is based on Section 4 and 5 in “My own preprint” [N24]. The presentation given here is adapted to fit the notation and overall structure of this thesis. With the exception of Lemma 3.17 and Example 3.21 all results presented here in Chapter 3 were already contained in [N24].
- A co-authorship statement for [EN23] has been handed in to the doctoral examination office of the Faculty of Mathematics and Computer Science.

If your doctoral thesis is a cumulative dissertation in the strict sense of §8 (7), this paragraph already governs how your previously published results form parts of the cumulative dissertation and hence no extra description is necessary in this case. However, if your previously published results are with co-authors, you still need to describe your own contribution (“Eigenanteil”) to these multi-authored preprints/papers either at the beginning of your cumulative dissertation or

with separate co-authorship statement(s) handed in to the doctoral examination office (“Prüfungsamt”). In the latter case, please indicate at the beginning of your cumulative dissertation that you handed in separate co-authorship statement(s).

Note: The dissertation (whether a monograph or cumulative) is independent of your master thesis. So if your master thesis is published as a paper (or results from the master thesis were published or were made into a preprint), this paper/preprint cannot be part of the research results counting towards your doctoral degree as your master degree was necessary to gain entrance into our doctoral programme. If the topic of your doctoral project and your master thesis is connected, make sure that you distinguish well enough between citing your master thesis (obviously ok) as you would cite any other work by others and using (chunks of) your master thesis as part of your doctoral thesis (not ok).
