Cluster of Excellence "Religion and Politics"

The Cluster of Excellence **"Religion and Politics. Dynamics of Tradition and Innovation"** has been investigating since 2007 the complex relationship between religion and politics across eras and cultures. In the funding phase from 2019 to 2025, the 140 researchers from 20 disciplines in the humanities and social sciences analyze in transepochal studies ranging from antiquity to the present day the factors that make religion the motor of political and social change. The research network is the largest of its kind in Germany; and, of the Clusters of Excellence, one of the oldest and the only one to deal with the issue of religion. It will receive funding of 31 million euros from 2019 to 2025.

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

Premodern Forms of Cultural Appropriation

The concept of 'Cultural Appropriation' entered the debate on post-colonialism in the 1970s and is today an integral part in discussions about racism and ongoing forms of colonialism as well as the questions concerning the colonial past and reparations. Despite the relevance of the topic, it has been mostly covered by (social) media and less by scholarship. Moreover, it has even less been applied to pre-colonialist times and in fact there is a great deal of disagreement whether it is even applicable to and fruitful for these periods.

The conference aims to discuss instances that can potentially be defined as cultural appropriations anywhere in the premodern world. Moreover, the applicability of the concept as well as the concept's advantages and disadvantages in relation to other practices and approaches such as occupation, inclusion, (dis)entanglement, and transculturality shall be thematised.
